MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER







Dear Parents and Students,

Since the last newsletter we have had a busy period with students, particularly in Year 11 taking GCSE mock examinations. This is of course a prelude to more of the same in February when our Post 16 students also get involved. Over recent years there has been a huge shift to the end of course examination model and I would like to really emphasise the importance of students preparing well and getting their revision 'nailed' over the Christmas holiday.

This is the time of year when we really encourage our young people to reflect on people both locally and globally who live in difficult circumstances. One thing (of many) that really impresses me about the students here at Sherburn High is their desire to make a difference by getting involved with charitable activities. This year again each of our houses has nominated a charity and the students are working hard to raise money through a variety of enterprising activities. In addition, over the last few weeks, our students have been producing and distributing hampers for the elderly in our local community.

School attendance is something we take very seriously at Sherburn High. If students are not here they cannot learn! I would like to thank parents very much for their support in ensuring that their children are in school as much as possible. As a consequence of our collective 'push' I am delighted to report that average attendance this term has been 96.4%, up from last year. Well done everyone! Uniform is also particularly good and I would like to thank all students and parents for their support in ensuring everyone looks smart with their shirts tucked in!

I am particularly delighted to be able to share with you the recently published A level data (Level 3 Valued Added) that measures the progress students make in the Sixth Form: our score of +0.30 will potentially place us in the top 4% of all schools nationally and puts us as the number one Sixth Form provider in the local area. It was wonderful to see so many Year 11 students and their families at our Sixth Form open evening; taster A level lessons are planned for the end of term and we are delighted with the high number of students who intend to continue their studies with us.

I would like to finish by thanking the Friends of Sherburn High School for all the support they give us through their fundraising. The recent "Accessorize" evening was a tremendous success and raised over £500 for the school. FOSH members, staff and students also supported at the South Milford Bonfire and raised funds for school. I appreciate very much the work that people put in to make these events happen for the benefit of our students and is another measure of the strength of our community. Please also see our "Easy Fundraising" drive and if you have a clear out over the holidays do send into school any unwanted clothes/shoes for our "Rag Bag" collection!

I would like to thank the many staff who organise visits and trips for Sherburn students – they go above and beyond to enrich the children's lives. I know it is disappointing if a trip is full and your son/daughter does not get a place but I would really appreciate it if we could celebrate the increasingly wide range of extra-curricular activities offered by staff and refrain from any negative complaints to trip leaders.

To conclude I would like to thank everyone for their support this year, it is very much appreciated. Have a great Christmas and here's to a really successful 2018 for Sherburn High School.

Mrs Oakes works exceptionally hard to ensure that students from primary school have an extremely smooth transition into high school as is explained in the full article below. Well done Mrs Oakes!

'We know that transition can be both an exciting yet worrying time for children and parents alike. With this in mind we have worked hard to create a comprehensive transition package that provides support from the moment parents and children are allocated to the school. From a series of parents' meetings to bespoke visits for vulnerable students, parents and students are supported every step of the way.

During the spring term the Transition Leader and Inclusion Leader visit the child's Year 6 teacher to discuss the needs of every student, both academically as well as socially and emotionally. This information is then disseminated to the relevant members of staff at the high school to ensure that every student and their needs are known to staff before they begin.

In the summer term, our innovative three-week transition programme begins in the final weeks of the school year. During this time, students complete transition activities such as tours of the school, getting to know staff and school rules and team-building activities to get to know one another. Our new Year 7 students spend the majority of that time in timetabled lessons (the rest of the School roll over at this time too). This means that students return in September ready to pick back up with their learning and they do not have to worry about learning about their new school's systems and rules.

We also recognise that transition is a yearlong process, not one that ends when students start back in September. All Year 7 students and parents are supported by an experienced pastoral team, including a House Achievement Leader and the Transition Leader.

We have found that for children, staff and parents, this has proven to be a successful model of transition. No longer do children spend the summer break worrying about the move to high school. Indeed, they spend the time with the new friends that they have made during transition and come back to school in September already feeling that they are part of our school family.'

It was an excellent trip and all students were brilliant ambassadors for Sherburn High School. It was good to see students really push themselves to their limits, and to show great teamwork and leadership skills by helping each other when some of them found the activities a little too challenging.

Boys will be Brilliant!

his term's tutorial focus has been Diversity. Within this our students spent time looking at gender stereotyping in the media which seems like a good time to remind you all that the progress of boys continues to be a key focus for Sherburn High School. Boys at Sherburn do perform better than national averages across all Key Stages (something we are very proud of), yet a gap between boys and girls persists.

At home, many of you will be experiencing some of the challenges that supporting teenage boys with their learning can present. With both my teacher and parent hat on, I have recently been reading 'Raising Boys' by Steven Biddulph. I would highly recommend adding this to your Christmas wish list if you want to better understand the inner workings of your son's brain and body.

In the meantime, here is a refresher with some top tips to support teenage boys with their learning at home:

- Promote a healthy breakfast and a drink every morning by not eating until 10.30am we have the reaction speeds of a 70-year-old!
- Improve independence and responsibility by not doing menial tasks for him. Encourage making lists to support personal organisation *the male mind works in a linear style.*
- The importance of **positive** male role models who are **actively involved and supportive** of his education cannot be overestimated for teenage boys **these do not necessarily have to be family to be effective.**
- Challenge socially accepted stereotypes of what being a boy means phrases like 'Man Up' and 'Take it like a Man' are not always helpful for a boy's self-esteem.
- Has he got an adequate pen to write with? Boy's motor skills are not as developed as girls at school age so a
 suitable pen is vital for good writing.
- Make time to read together, even if only for 5 minutes a day reading could include a comic, sports report, news article, and magazines.
- Display work, postcards, positive reports, certificates etc. somewhere prominent in the house **boys are too easily given attention for negative reasons because they are boys, they need more praise than girls.**
- Talk with, not at him about his learning.
- Short term goals, short term targets, short term rewards = **boys striving for success**.

 Use Show my Homework to support your son complete homework on time and to a high quality standard.

In January, we will be running a Parent Workshop on strategies to support teenage boys with their learning. This will be open to all parents of boys in any year group so please keep your eyes peeled for further details on this.


to experience life in their future working environment.






Who's leading the reading?

Sherburn High Goes Live on BBC Radio Five Live

n Wednesday 6th December, a group of ten Sherburn High students were interviewed live on BBC Radio Five Live over in MediaCityUK, Salford. We've been working on a secret mission with the BBC over the last few months on their new 'Fake News' project which aims to help students develop their media literacy so they can decode the media and understand what is, or indeed what isn't fake news.

It was very exciting to receive a call from BBC School Report telling us they'd spotted our fake news reporting on the Sherburn High BBC School Report webpage back in March. Based on our journalistic merit, they invited us to take part in the Children's Global Media Launch and appear live on the afternoon edition of BBC Radio Five Live with presenters Sarah Brett and Nihal Arthanayake.

Our students were amazing on air and - despite Miss Jackson telling them they'd be on air for about ten minutes - they filled an entire hour! Students discussed where they access the news, how they spot a fake news story and why they think people produce fake news in the first place. Caitlin, Olivia and Alex sat at the desk with the presenters and everyone else squeezed into the studio with the dramatic skyline of MediaCityUK in the background.

It was amazing to see how live radio actually works. You can listen in to the episode on BBC iPlayer until the end of the month but it will give you no clue as to how many people are involved in the making of the show and how fast the pace is. Our students were brilliant - but listen in and judge for yourselves.

Students were also interviewed for the BBC Radio Five Live Facebook and Twitter page and have put together a video guide - 'How to Spot Fake News'.

We had a little spare time to explore MediaCityUK and see BBCSport, CBeebies, the ITV studios and Coronation Street and a replica Rovers Return front. The super sleuth skills of Mrs Debbie Jackson revealed we had a brush with Royalty as we just missed the Duke of Cambridge and Prince George arriving at the BBC Studios! If only that tram had arrived earlier...

Thank you to Caitlin Ross, Lucy Walton, Noah Stokes-Waters, Eddie Thirsk, Ben Dingwall, Alex Johnson, Maya Kakkar, Mia Newton, Lucie Clifton and Olivia Rooney for sharing their own opinions so confidently and showing over five million listeners how fabulous Sherburn High students are!




E-Safety doesn't just stop at social sites, it covers your whole presence online. The most basic thing to bear in mind, is having a strong password and making sure you do not use it more than once, a password manager can help here or 2 factor authentication. A password manager assists in generating and retrieving complex passwords, potentially storing such passwords in an encrypted database or calculating them on demand. The threat of cybercrime is increasing year on year and the best way to protect yourself is by a strong password.

Passwords should now be called PassPhrases. Usually passwords can be cracked in a matter of hours/days using wordlist attacks - this can be a list taken from a recent security breach; which will be a list of real world passwords. PassPhrases (containing more than 15 characters) take longer to crack. If you'd like to know more about "Passwords vs PassPhrases", a Google search (other search engines are available) for "Passwords vs PassPhrases" will help you understand the differences. Also a search for "Top 100 Passwords" will show 2 results to the telegraph which are a good read too. If you do not have a PIN / passcode / Fingerprint security on your phone, we advise you to set it up, having at least 6 characters as a PIN code.

Passwords are often taken for granted with people not seeing their importance. Only you should know your password, think of it as you would, your bank account PIN number. As soon as your password is leaked, they may have more information about you than you think.

Just to leave you with this thought: There are 600,000 hackers logging into FACEBOOK everyday trying to breach user's personal security, please keep your details secure!


