MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER



Dear Parents and Students,

Welcome back to what promises to be a busy summer term at Sherburn High School; not least with work starting on the 3G Pitch!

It is with much appreciation that I can let you know of our recent Ofsted visit. The report is now released and I would like to thank all parents and students for their feedback and participation. Watch this space for a soon to be shared Ofsted special.

At Sherburn High we believe that success at school is more likely if our students have the opportunity to have stimulating and exciting learning experiences beyond as well as within the classroom.

I have been reviewing all the extra-curricular opportunities which have been made available recently. I counted 76 visits, trips and activities so far, including, amongst others: Geography field visits, revision days in Leeds, theatre visits to York, Technology tournaments, University fairs, The Clothes Show at the Birmingham NEC, Life Sciences Museum trip and outdoor activities at Bewerley Park. As well as our skiing experience in February, there have also been opportunities for students to take part in foreign visits to Paris and the Ardeche in France. Not to mention the amazing "Night at the Musicals"!

This of course does not include the substantial range of weekly clubs, sporting, music and drama activities.

I would like to pay tribute to all my colleagues who, like me, believe these experiences are so important and give freely of their own time to make them a reality. It is their commitment which is so crucial in making Sherburn High School the really special place that it is.

As I write, our Year 11, 12 and 13 students are now embarking upon the final phase of their preparations for the all -important GCSE, AS and A2 examinations this summer. I speak to students frequently about the high expectations we have of them as a school and they are responding exceptionally well to the challenge I have put before them. A huge amount of effort is being placed into developing their grades with extra coursework sessions, Period 6, revision workshops and booster classes. We are also very conscious that exams create significant anxiety for many students and we strive to support their emotional needs during this stressful time.

It is wonderful to see the young people responding so maturely to what is being offered here. What we are trying to create is a genuine team spirit here with everyone in the school, both staff and students working together to achieve the very best results we can. As a result, our current tracking data suggests that this year's grades are likely to be the best the school has ever produced!

Here's to a really successful (and hopefully warmer) summer term!

The cast of actors explored the process and effects of radicalisation and extremism, both far right wing extremism and Al Qaida narrative inspired extremism. This show and workshop, which together fit into an hour lesson, tackle this controversial issue in an engaging, respectful and thought provoking way. Students had the opportunity to text the characters during the workshops with questions about the performance, also to offer suggestions and solutions to help the friends end the rift.




Library News



Welcome back after a long last term and a couple of weeks break. I am sure this term will fly by; we are already into our third week with only two left to go!



Ella won first place for her grade and instrument in the solo class, here she is performing and receiving her trophy.






Congratulations to Year 8 student **Luke Hebbron** who took part in the Crimebeat competition to help his local community (see separate article). Well done for volunteering Luke!








Malham Delights

n Monday 24th and Tuesday 25th April, Year 7 students were lucky enough to visit Malham to get first-hand experience as geographers and to view the glacial features they had studied in Geography lessons. They also investigated the impacts of tourism in the National Park. They spent their time doing surveys, graphs and (of course) having fun! They were split into two groups for the separate days. 'We thoroughly enjoyed our time' said Holly Walker.

Firstly, they spent an excitable time on a coach, for 1 hour 40 minutes through the winding country roads until they arrived at Malham National Park Centre. As they will agree, their energy was full to the point of bubbling!



Some of the Year 7s went to the village and asked people a few questions about Malham. As they just arrived, they also did some exploring; they found a stream, bridges and lots of hills.

After exploring, they set off walking towards Janet's Foss, a big waterfall with stunning views and clear blue water; this magical setting is believed to be home of Janet, the Queen of the Fairies. Lots of birds were nesting and the students sat on rocks in the water and enjoyed a nice peaceful lunch. They took soundscapes and environmental surveys and also found a money tree which was full of coppers that had been stuck in the tree as wishes, hoping to come true.

They then had to walk all the way to Malham Cove but the walk was worth it. Up and down, high and low, they had to hike to reach the stunning view of Malham Cove, an amazing vertical limestone feature which had been created by glaciers. They had to then tackle the sharp rocks running through the vast stream so they could get to the base of the Cove. Sitting on a small rock approximately 1-metre high they all had their photos taken, careful not to disrupt any of the climbers attempting to ascend the vertical sides of the Cove. Some of them looked as proud as punch.

After a long day, they set off back on the long haul to the bus. They came across cows, dogs and lots of sheep. In the middle of walking home, big chunks of hail stones fell upon the students, they were soaking. 'But it was all part of the thrill of being there' said Eliza Dulson.






Ski Trip, February 2017

herburn High is very sad to announce the death of the much loved and respected ex-Head of Art, Mervyn Wilson, who died tragically whilst on a cycling holiday in Spain last month.

Mervyn joined our team in 1999 and completely transformed the Art Department with his inspirational and innovative teaching style. Students loved his sense of humour and laid back personality, allowing them to develop their own unique style through his motivational mentoring techniques. Mervyn brought in artists to inspire and support projects and took numerous groups out to the Tate Modern, Yorkshire Sculpture Park and other museums and galleries, all of which the students spoke highly of. He also instigated the annual GCSE and A'Level art exhibition, inviting parents, staff and the press along to celebrate students work. It is very telling that many of his A level students continued to stay in touch with him once they had left.

Getting involved in charity events was one of Mervyn's fortes, dressing up in crazy costumes, taking part in Rock the Quad and cycling for a variety of charities, he did it with gusto!

Mr Askins, Mervyn's friend and ex colleague who delivered a eulogy at Mervyn's funeral said 'The word legend is often used, particularly by young people to describe someone. It is often used flippantly. Mervyn was a legend. He was a hugely passionate, popular and successful teacher. Everybody liked Mervyn. He was hugely intelligent, extremely creative, he could make you cry with laughter, we will all miss him terribly.'









Work Commences on the Artificial Grass Sports Pitch

The new 106m x 70m floodlit, 3G, artificial pitch will support grass roots sport in the area, be used by the school during the day and open to the wider community during evenings and weekends. The facility includes ample parking, fenced and floodlit, full size pitch and changing rooms with shower facilities and will be available to the residents of Sherburn-In-Elmet and the surrounding villages for a range of multi sports including football, rugby and hockey training.
