Dear Parents and Students,

It's been a great start to Year 7 and we have high hopes that we will continue to see great things from the new members of our Sherburn family.






Peter Pan Project

Boys will be Brilliant!

ast month saw the annual Sherbies and it was fantastic to see a record number of boys receiving nominations and awards across **all** year groups and in **all** subjects. Two of our Year 9 boys also achieved success in the recent Eurofest competition (see separate article). As you may be aware, the 'gender gap' is very much a national issue in education. A white, working class boy remains the least likely to study at University than any other group in the UK. A full breakdown of how our boys performed at the Sherbies can be seen opposite.

The progress and achievement of boys at Sherburn High School is a key priority for us. We were delighted that the recent OFSTED report recognised the progress Sherburn High is making at closing this gender gap. The GCSE progress measures of our boys in 2016 and predicted 2017 is above national average for boys, and at A Level boys and girls perform equally. Nevertheless, closing the 'gender gap' is still a big priority for the school, particularly in terms of literacy.

At home, many of you will be aware of some of the challenges supporting teenage boys with their learning can present. With both my teacher and parent hat on, I have recently been reading 'Raising Boys' by Steven Biddulph. I would highly recommend finding time to read this if you want to better understand the inner workings of your son's brain and body.

In the meantime, here is a refresher in some top tips to support teenage boys with their learning at home:

- Promote a healthy breakfast and a drink every morning; by not eating until 10.30am we have the reaction speeds of a 70-year-old!
- Improve independence and responsibility by not doing menial tasks for him. Encourage making lists to support personal organisation; **the male mind works in a linear style.**
- The importance of **positive** male role models who are **actively involved and supportive** of his education cannot be overestimated for teenage boys, these do not necessarily have to be family to be effective.
- Challenge socially accepted stereotypes of what being a boy means; phrases like 'Man Up' and 'Take it like a Man' are not always helpful for a boy's self-esteem.
- Has he got an adequate pen to write with? Boys motor skills are not as developed as girls at school age so a suitable pen is vital for good writing.
- Make time to read together, even if only for 5 minutes a day; reading could include a comic, sports report, news article, and magazines.
- Display work, postcards, positive reports, certificates etc. somewhere prominent in the house. Boys are too easily given attention for negative reasons because they are boys; they need more praise than girls.
- Talk with, not at him about his learning.
- Short term goals, short term targets, short term rewards = boys striving for success.
- Use Show my Homework to support your son complete homework on time and to a high quality standard.

Future Jobs - Careers advice company, Future Jobs, spent three days working with Year 12 students, showing them all the options available to them after they finish their sixth form studies. The sessions included individual careers interviews that used online testing to show students the different ways of achieving their dream job. The sessions were very successful and inspired our students to think about what they want to do after Year 13. The advisors also gave them many practical tips about applying to university and showed them websites to use when looking for apprenticeships.

York St John University Marketing Group - A group of Year 12 students volunteered their time to participate in a marketing session for York St John University. Tom Bolland, Chloe Bredesen, Elisha Stacey, Molly Barraclough, Liam Donegan, Holly Kersley and Tegan Davies (from Tadcaster) met with two members of the university's marketing team to provide feedback on their 2019 marketing campaign.

Our students were given images and slogans to discuss which they provided the university with opinions about which ones would be most appealing to potential future York St John's students. So when the promotional material for 2019 entry is released, we can feel proud that Sherburn students had an input into the final campaign.

Work Experience - The whole of Year 12 were out on work experience at the beginning of July and the overwhelming feedback has been fantastic. Students went to some brilliant placements, including Leeds Dental Hospital, a GP surgery, a number of solicitors, HR departments, primary schools, a youth work setting and design agencies. Well done Year 12 for being such great ambassadors for Sherburn Sixth Form!

system and many have already started visiting potential universities. So far, we've had students visit Edinburgh, Bristol, Leeds, Manchester Met, Lincoln and even Cambridge, with interest in courses including Biochemistry, Accounting, Medicine, Marketing

and Sport. Leeds University Ethics Workshop - Elizabeth Clarkson, one of our Year 12 students, was successful in gaining a place at a

medical ethics workshop run by Leeds University. The workshop required students to consider different ethical scenarios, including examples such as what to do if you realise a colleague has made a mistake. All the scenarios were hospital based, so the workshop will look great on Lizzie's UCAS application to study Radiography.

The Shakespeare Experience!

n 10th and 11th July, Sherburn High School's new Year 7 students completed 'Adventures of English' as part of their transition into life at high school. Parents and Carers were invited to join our new cohort in getting to grips with Shakespeare and to learn a little about how lessons are delivered in order to get a taste for secondary English.

Through role play, students interviewed William Shakespeare's father John, explored the language, life and times of the Bard and considered why we still study Shakespeare today. Students were given the opportunity to play the witches from Macbeth and were treated to a fantastic performance of Macbeth by some of our Year 10 drama students.

One parent said "It was a fabulous morning seeing children, teachers and parents interacting", another commented "I enjoyed the insight into what the students do at High

School: there was good interaction between groups. The staff made it fun for all, as well as interesting and were very knowledgeable."




Library News

Well done Lotherton, you are awesome readers!




Salt to the Sea by Ruth Sepetys Carnegie Medal Winner

Refugees from Germany who were fleeing from Russia's Red Army, made a long journey to board ships near Gdansk in Poland on the Baltic Sea. The Wilhelm Gustloff, a luxury liner, one of the many ships, was built to carry 1500 passengers. At the time of boarding there were well over 10,000 people on board, mainly women and children, and tragically it was torpedoed by the Russian Navy and sank. Only 1,252 people survived. It was the worst shipping disaster ever but very little was known about it or reported.

Ruth Sepetys brought this tragic story to life for us through four main characters who made the arduous journey to what they thought was their freedom and a new life. It is a brilliant read, one that will remain in our minds for a very long time!

Happy New Academic School Year to you all. Students are adjusting well to new timetables and continue to focus on their learning.


Year 11s are in the process of sitting their mock exams and our new Year 7 students are adjusting to the hourly move around school and varied teachers.

Wow, another year has come to an end and we've now rolled over!



Congratulations to all students nominated at our annual


celebration evening known as the Sherbies. It is a great achievement to be selected; this is a chance for staff to pay tribute to students who go above and beyond, well done to all the winners.
